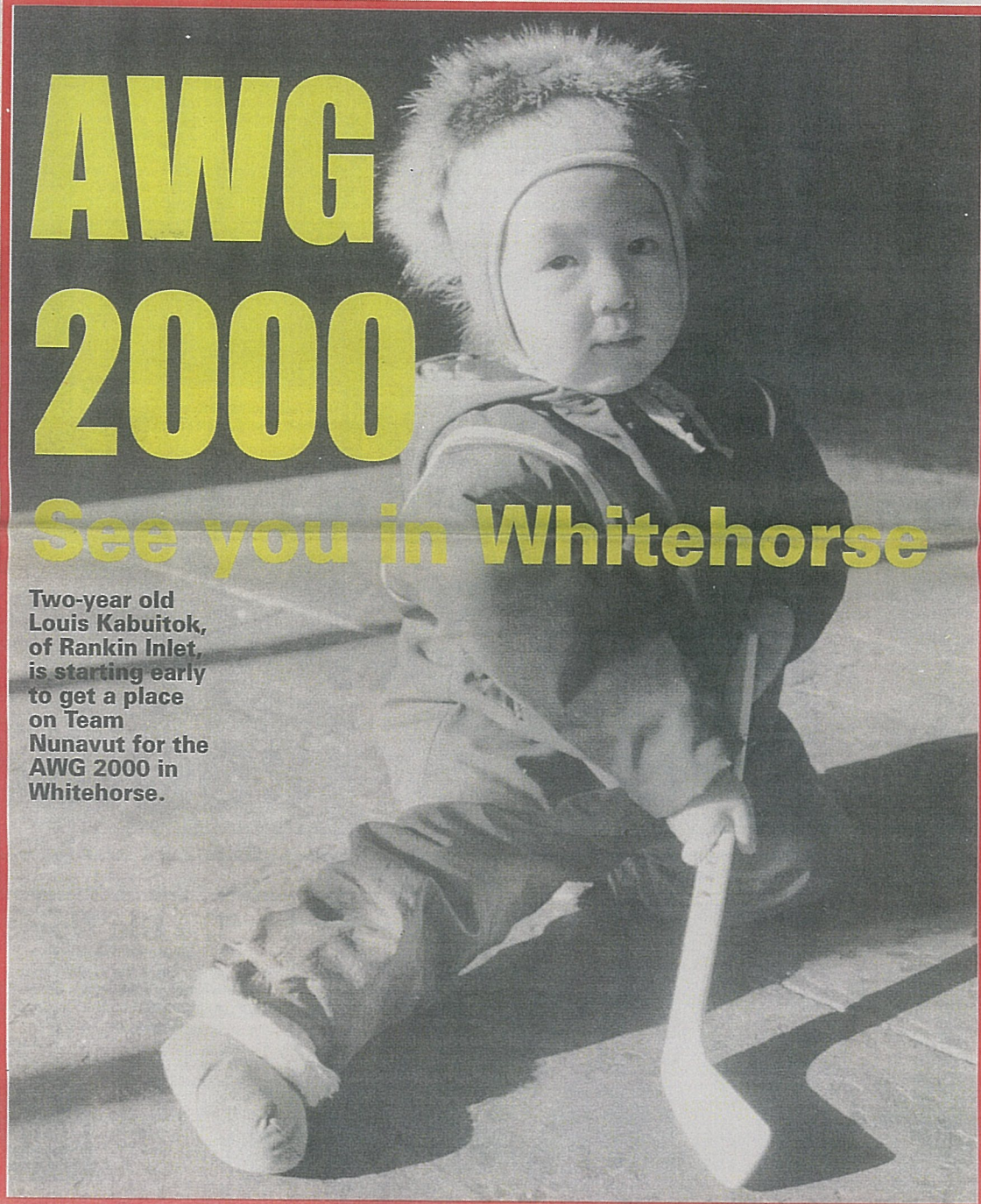

Showdown at dawn

Most of Yellowknife was slumbering peacefully when Alberta and the Yukon faced off for a gold ulu in Junior Women's Hockey early, very early, this morning.

Scheduling a gold ulu game at 7 a.m. has raised some eyebrows - especially since it's a women's event. "A gold medal game should not be played at 7 a.m. You cannot showcase your top two teams with a game at 7 a.m. - you just can't do it," says Yukon Junior Women's coach Laura Cabott.

Cabott says organizers deserve full marks for their hard work and for a well-run tournament but she believes the decision to schedule the Junior Women's final for 7 a.m. should have been revisited. "It's almost always the women's organizations that get the lousy times," says Cabott. "People are

talking about this. It's got to be changed."

Scheduling aside, Cabott says her young and relatively inexperienced team must play Alberta's fast-paced game if they're going to win a gold ulu this morning.

"Alberta's players are skilled, fast skaters and quick. We need to play at their speed and get on them early in the game if we're going to win," Cabott said in an interview last night. "And they've got good goaltending so we're going to have to shoot the puck on the net and keep up the pace."

Team Yukon's youth and relative

inexperience, however, will make it difficult for them to upset the undefeated Alberta squad which earned a bye into the finals with six straight wins. "We've got some very good young players and some younger players with no experience, this is their very first big tournament," says Cabott. "Alberta has a strong hockey program that is years ahead of us. It's going to be hard to compete."

Whatever the outcome of this morning's gold ulu game, Cabott says she's been "very pleased" with her team's performance in the AWG. "They've done very well."

Outstanding players include Ruby Ho, a two-way performer who can play defence and forward, netminder Ty Wilkinson and blueliner Krystal Mason.

Team Yukon advanced to the gold ulu final by edging the Northwest Territories 6-5 in yesterday's semi-final.

Cabott says her team and the NWT are evenly matched but the Yukon won the day by putting in a good, solid performance and coming out more quickly than the NWT.

"I'm surprised they were a little sluggish, but they never give up," says Cabott with respect for her NWT

opponents. "We were leading by three or four goals at the beginning of the third, but they didn't give up until the game was over."

"The NWT has some very talented young players and some older experienced players. It was a pleasure playing them," she adds.

The Yukon and NWT were fairly close in the standings prior to the semi-finals. The NWT had compiled three wins, two losses and a tie in six outings, while the Yukon earned two wins, three losses and a tie. Team Alaska rounded out the field with wins in six outings.

The Alberta Junior Women's hockey team is going for gold this morning in honor of teammate Krystal Gillespie who flew home last night to be with her terminally ill father.

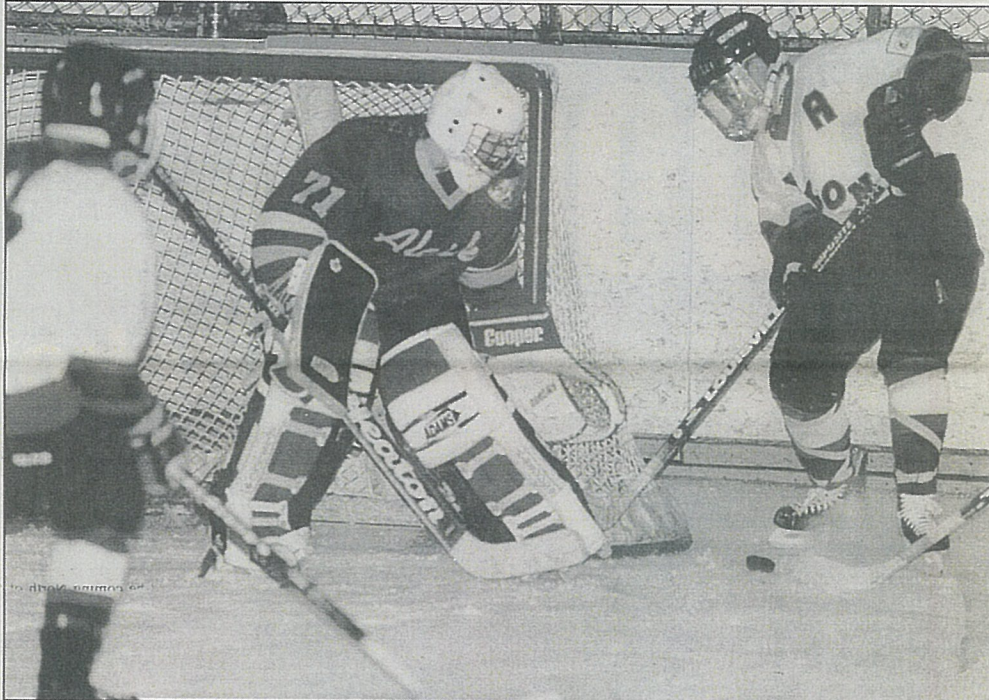

Seize the spirit at the 2000 Games

When the Games torch lights the flame in Whitehorse two years from now, it'll be the start of more than just the 16th Arctic Winter Games. Much more.

"One reason it's exciting is the 50th anniversary of our City incorporation," says Mayor Kathy Watson. "It will be the kick-off event for those celebrations."

The Yukon capital's colorful heritage as a major staging point in the Klondike Gold Rush of 1897-98, is itself the subject of intense celebration these days. It will also be a major test of the City's ability to handle a truly mammoth undertaking, its bid to host the Canada Winter Games in 2007. (See sidebar)

Led by Mayor Watson, Whitehorse has had a delegation of 2000 Games Committee members in Yellowknife for the week.

They've been working the hospitality rooms, media and officials, urging everyone to "Seize the Spirit!" as the theme of their event.

Tom O'Hara and one other staffer have been hired

to set up the office and the big job of co-ordination and planning that lies ahead.

One item yet to be finalized with the International Board is the actual date, likely to be late February or early March 2000.

Organizers are confident Magadan and Tyumen will be back, and there may be a third Russian province knocking at the door.

And of course, it will be first time for the new territory of Nunavut, making for at least eight contingents.

On the sports side, Whitehorse wants to re-introduce alpine skiing, and add a new event - you guessed it - snowboarding, owing to its explosive popularity.

It all sounds like a great time coming up in the (dare we say it?) start of the millennium in Whitehorse, Yukon!

Whitehorse bids for Canada Games in 2007

Canada's biggest winter sporting event could be coming North of 60 in 2007.

It's more than just a dream or a concept, says Whitehorse Mayor Kathy Wilson.

"There's a very good chance we'll get them."

The City already has first right of refusal on the date with the Canada Games Board, but Mayor Wilson knows a whole lot more has to be done before they can get the green light sometime in 2000.

"We have most of the facilities required, but we need to upgrade the swimming pool and add one rink."

On top of that, the city of 25,000 will have to prove it can muster the 2,000 volunteers needed to run the 13-day event.

That's why the 2000 Arctic Winter Games are critical, as they'll be the benchmark for Yukon's organizational skills.

"We're excited as this is our opportunity for training and honing our expertise," said Mayor Watson. "It's a giant undertaking, but so are the returns: an estimated \$40 million in spending will come, plus enhanced facilities, based on the experience of Brandon, Manitoba and Gander, Newfoundland.

Mayor Watson's confidence comes through as she sizes up her city's approach.

"People in the North are anxious, willing and ready to roll up their sleeves do a damn good job."

Grisha Vlasov, 13, contributed an amazing four gold ulus to the Tyumen tally by completely dominating Junior table tennis.

One table-tennis official who watched Grisha play all week said the young Russian was undoubtedly the best player in the tournament. Grisha is described as an intense player who gives 100 per cent each and every game.

Grisha is a dedicated table tennis player, practicing two-and-a-half hours a day, six days a week, says his father and coach, Sergey Vlasov.

He plays a little soccer in the summer, but table tennis is his first love. Grisha has been playing the sport since he was seven years old.

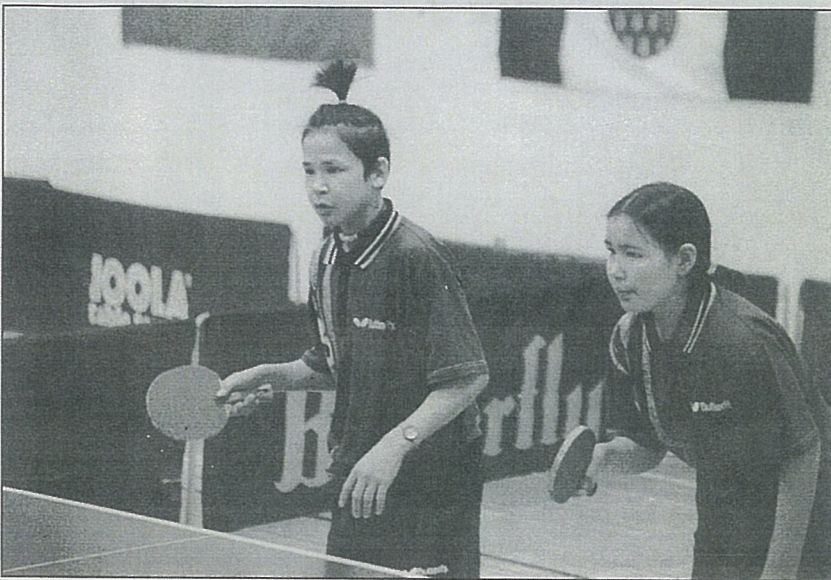
Speaking through an interpreter, Grisha described his performance yesterday as "okay" which brought hearty laughter from father Sergey. The elder Vlasov had nothing but praise for his son's performance at the AWG.

"He did much better than two years ago in Alaska," says Sergey, in large part because Grisha and his teammates have become close friends and communicate better when competing in doubles and mixed doubles.

These friendships are a double-edged sword, however, because Grisha's toughest competition at the AWG came from doubles teammate Vadim Shamshurin who won two silver and two gold ulus. Grisha won the gold in Junior Men's singles, while Vadim takes home the silver.

Grisha also played off against Shamsurin in mixed doubles. Grisha and Nastja Tsurkan won the gold medal, while Vadim and Anastasia Dolgopolova won the silver ulu. Nastja won the gold ulu in Junior Girls' singles and Anastasia the bronze ulu.

When asked what he liked best about the AWG, Grisha said that he's enjoyed the competition, talking with athletes from the other teams and the community

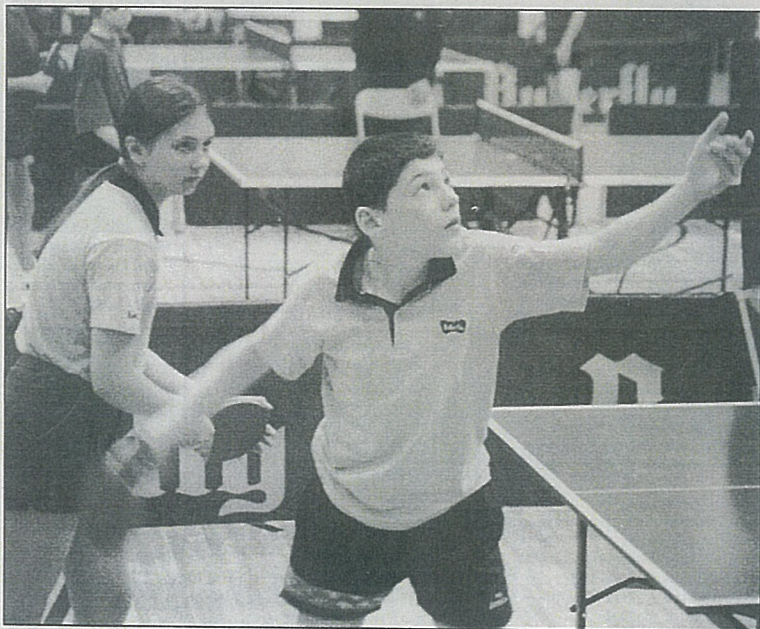
Petrus Bronlund, left, and Nive Bertelsen and of Greenland were unable to defeat Tyumen in their quest for a gold ulu.

"We would like to say thank you for everything they did. They made the Arctic Winter Games like one big festival for the children. It was great," says Sergey through the translator.

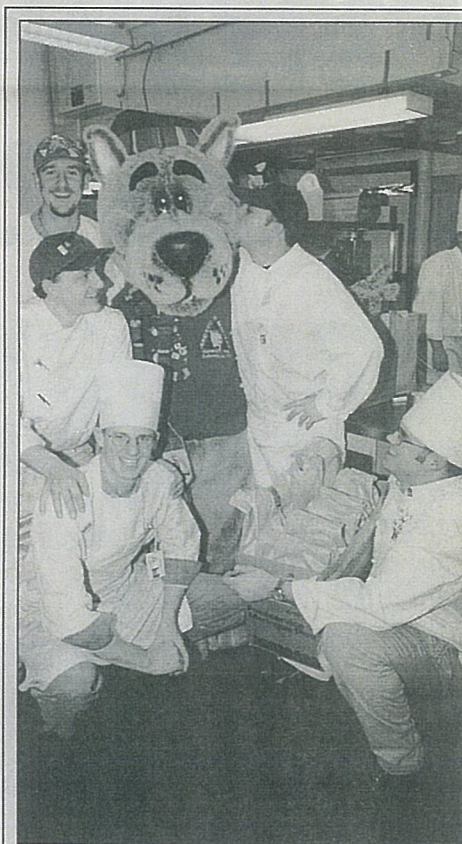
Asked if they had any complaints, Sergey said with a laugh and a pat of his stomach "...the food. There's too much of it!"

Through all the glamor, shining lights and intricate costumes, a common thread connected the artists performing at last night's Arctic Winter Gala.

Each cultural contingent, in its own distinct way, told the story of their past and shared their hopes for the future.

Performers from Greenland, the Yukon, Alaska, Northern Alberta, Russia and the Northwest Territories all shared a part of their heritage with the intention of preserving and promoting the traditions of days gone by.

Six-piece musical ensemble Tupaarnaq, alongside solo act Miki Jacobsen sang historic folk songs about their home, Greenland.

The Yukon contributed the Northern Lights Dancers, a contemporary dance group who dedicated one of their routines to the 100-year anniversary of the Klondike Gold Rush.

The Alaska Northstar Performers were made up of Tlingit and Athabaskan indigenous entertainers who had to gain permission from their clans to perform their sacred songs - some of which were so old that their ancestors sang them when the glaciers were still moving around.

The Pey Wapun dancers from Northern Alberta were born out

of the need to instill identity and pride in the indigenous people in the Grand Prairie area.

Ener, the professional dance troupe from Magadan, performed ancient dances from the steppes of Russia.

Their costumes showed the influence of European and Asian cultures on their costumes, which are different from the traditional clothes of the Northwest Territories.

Being on home turf, the NWT was able to stage a variety of different acts that represented the vast range of cultural heritage in Northern Canada.

The NWT contingent included acts from Taloyoak, Aklavik, Rae-Edzo, Tulita and Yellowknife.

The theme was the importance of passing their knowledge on to the next generation.

The audience of more than 300 people was captivated by the three-hour show.

At the end, the performers and hosts were rewarded with an explosion of applause, leaving no doubt that they had won over the capacity crowd.

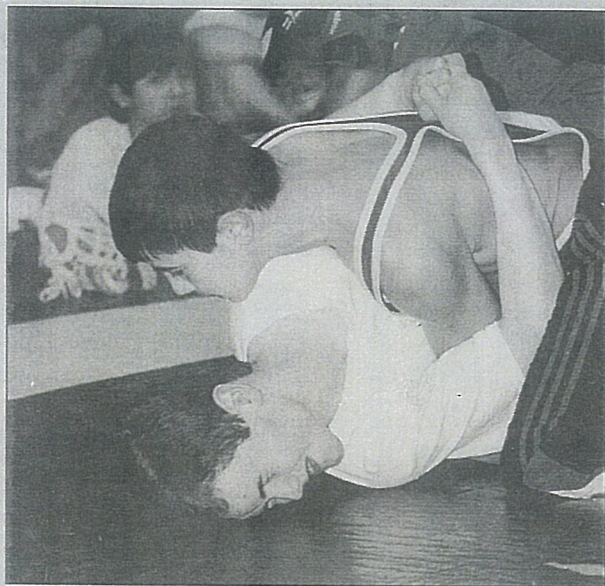

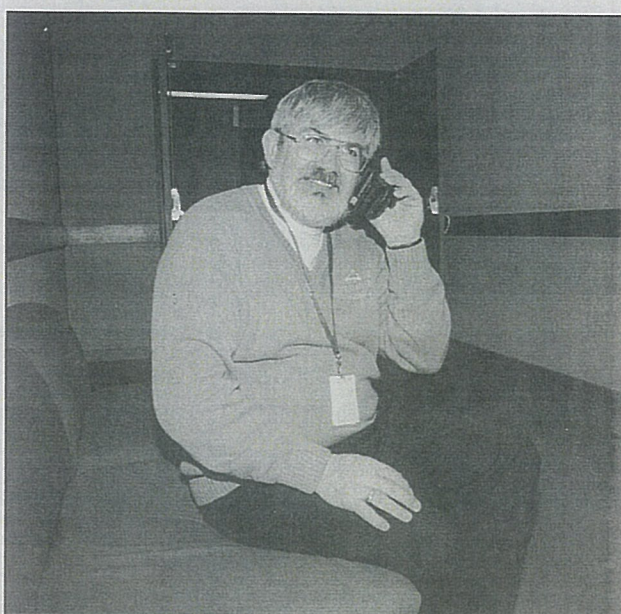
Learning the ABCs of the AWG with Joe Walsh

Even after two years going flat out as AWG '98's general manager, Joe Walsh still doesn't hate his cell phone.

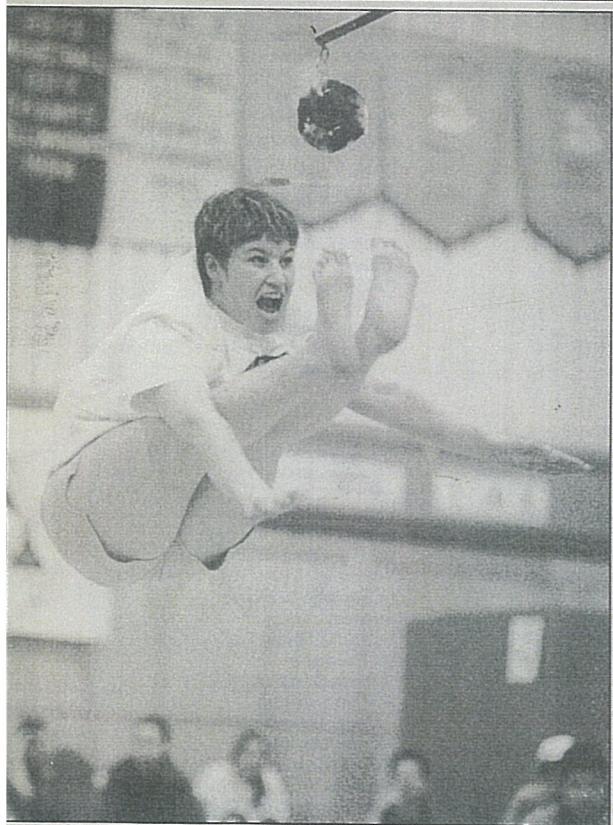

"I actually like it," says Walsh. "There's a lot of decisions that have to be made on a timely basis. The phone helps do this."
It's the kind of no-nonsense answer one might expect from a man with almost 40 years experience in senior administration, most of it in the mining industry.
After arriving in Yellowknife in 1976, Walsh pursued his love of sports and volunteering by joining hockey and Winter Games committees. When he took on the job as general manager for the '98 Games, he thought he knew the ropes.
"I've learned so much since then," says the soft-spoken Walsh. Things like who his friends are and who he could count on.
"They just go out and work hours and hours and hours, whatever it takes to get the job done."
Walsh says his most daunting task was preparing to accommodate and feed more than 1,600 people who would flood into Yellowknife. A big part of the answer was several truckloads of beds from the Canada Games, but logistically, the transport and storage - by road, rail and barge - was "very labour intensive."
He's proud of his staffers Joyce Patterson, Cindy Were and Debbie Lougheed, and that

fact they worked well together and became and still are good friends.
But what delighted Walsh was the success of his initiative to involve young people, between 12 and 18 years, on all of the 20-plus committees. About 100 came on board.
"I said I wanted to get youth in the organizing committee, so they could carry on with the job."
In the weeks leading up to opening night, Walsh was getting by on as little as two hours of sleep a night.
"I was coming to work at 4 a.m.," he says.
That's eased off to about five hours a night during Games week, and it should get a whole lot better by the time he turns in the office keys in May.
Then the 57-year old father of three (and expectant grandfather in June) plans to really retire.
He admits he's a bit apprehensive of retirement, but plans more volunteer work, and continuing to live in Yellowknife.
What's the first thing on his retirement list?
"I'm going to start organizing a garage sale. We've been married for 35 years, and we've never had one. It should be a lulu."



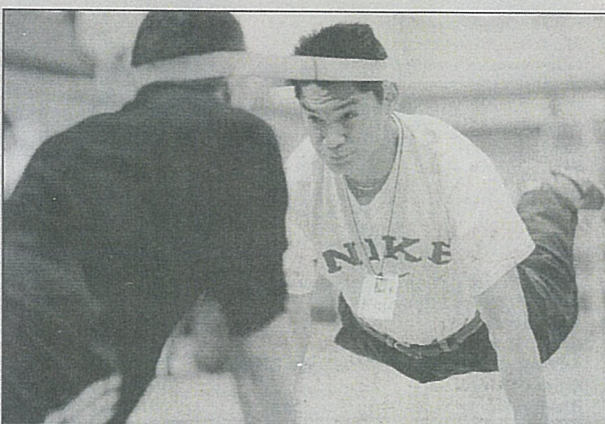
