So long til '86 in Whitehorse

The 1984 Arctic Winter Games are over.

Yukon athletes were honored at the closing ceremonies with the Stuart Hodgson Trophy, awarded at each Games to the team that best exemplifies the qualities of sportsmanship.

It was the third consecutive Games that the Yukoners were selected the most sportsmanlike contingent.

The record will show that the N.W.T. team captured the Games' flag as unofficial Games' winners. The Territories, with strong performances in hockey, curling, Arctic sports, indoor soccer and badminton, collected 49 gold ulus and 113 in all.

Alaskans were right on their heels all the way, dominating the shooting and cross country skiing events to earn 42

gold and a total of 108 ulus. Yukon was not far behind, with 22 gold and 97 total.

What the records will not show, however, and what all concerned with the Games should consider the most important aspect, is the friendly competition and cultural exchange among the people of the north that they afford.

Most of the participants will have fond memories of Yellowknife in 1984, its citizens should be proud to have been able to share their city and proud of their accomplishments.

Old friendships have been rekindled; new ones have been made and the spirit of the Games will continue.

We'll see you all again, in Whitehorse in 1986.

But it's not all over yet...

The athletes, officials and dignitaries have all gone home and Yellowknife has returned to normal (if you can call Caribou Carnival week and spring-like weather normal).

But for the people at the Games' office, there is still much to be done.

Dick Loiselle, general manager of the Games, still has the job of ensuring that all the equipment bought, borrowed and begged is returned, that facilities are restored to their original condition and his final Games' report, traditionally a massive volume covering every aspect of the preparation and running of the Games over the past two years.

He and his staff — executive secretary Sue Hamelin and sports co-ordinator David Leck — and others will have another month's dedication to the task.

"The Games were good for the athletes; we're happy with the results," he said Tuesday at the Games' office.

There were problems. Perhaps the biggest was the beds which took three days to put up. But Yellowknifers rallied to the call for help.

There were 55 people equipped with screwdrivers and wrenches at St. Pat's (Saturday) and 100 at Sir John. The beds were down and loaded on the trucks in three hours.

"There's always little bonfires to put out, but we were able to keep them away from the athletes," he said Monday at the Games' office.

Loiselle also had praise for the competitors. "It's a credit to the athletes, with the frustrations of living in dorms, perhaps the frustration of not winning an ulu. There was very little damage at the accommodations."

They did well. Everyone did.

Hodgson trophy to stay here

The Hodgson Trophy, awarded to the team showing the most sportsmanlike conduct, will have a permanent home at Yellowknife's Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre.

The trophy, which was awarded Friday to the Yukon contingent for the third consecutive Games, was turned over to the N.W.T. government by Arctic Winter Games corporation president Barry Robb following the closing of the Games.

It was first presented to the corporation by then Commissioner Stuart M. Hodgson. The Alaskan team was the first recipient at the Hay River - Pine Point Games.

The trophy, a decorated narwhal tusk with soapstone carvings of a polar bear and a walrus on a rosewood base is an original work by N.W.T. carver Moses Aupaluktuk.

Valued at over \$30,000, the trophy is being turned over to the territorial government because it is difficult to care for and to move properly, particularly between Canada and the United States when it is required to be cleared through Customs.

The territorial government will provide a replacement trophy to be kept by the winning contingent between Games.

"It is appropriate that the trophy remain in the N.W.T. as the territorial government first presented it to the Games Corporation and will now undertake its care and display," said N.W.T. government leader Richard Nerysoo, who along with Commissioner John Parker, signed the gift agreement with Robb.

The trophy will be exhibited regularly at the Heritage Centre.

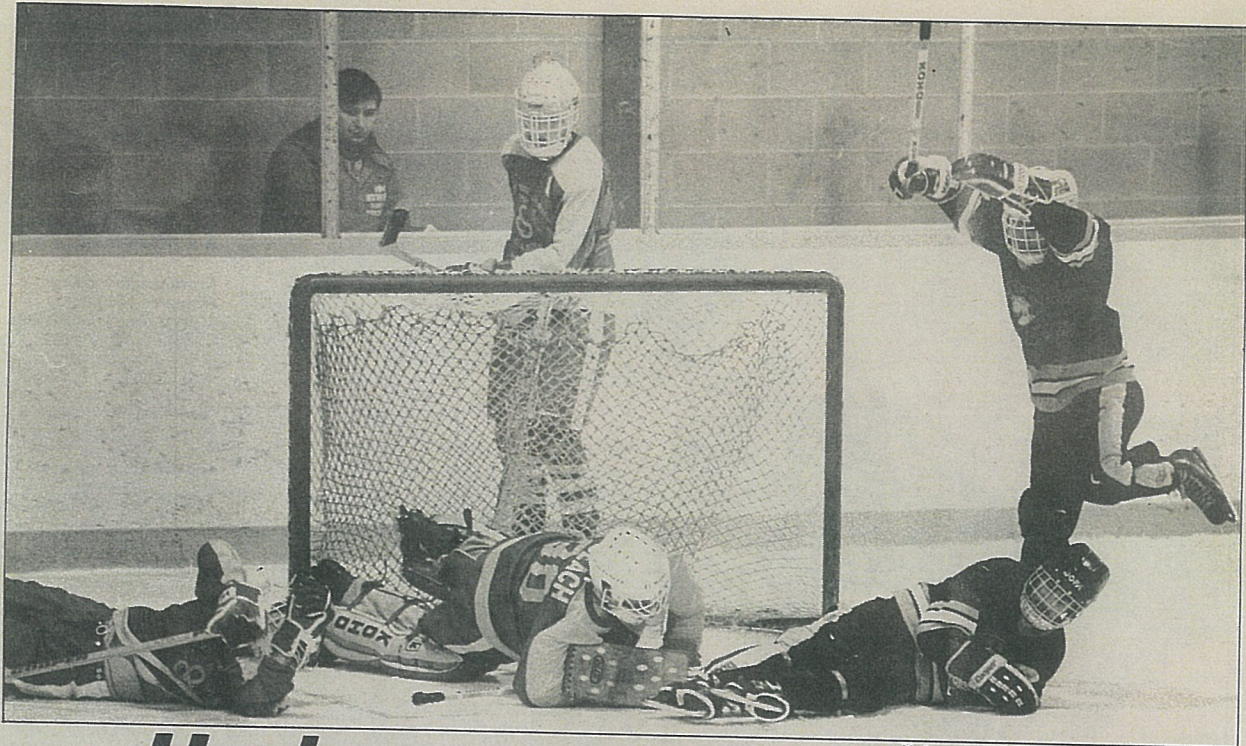

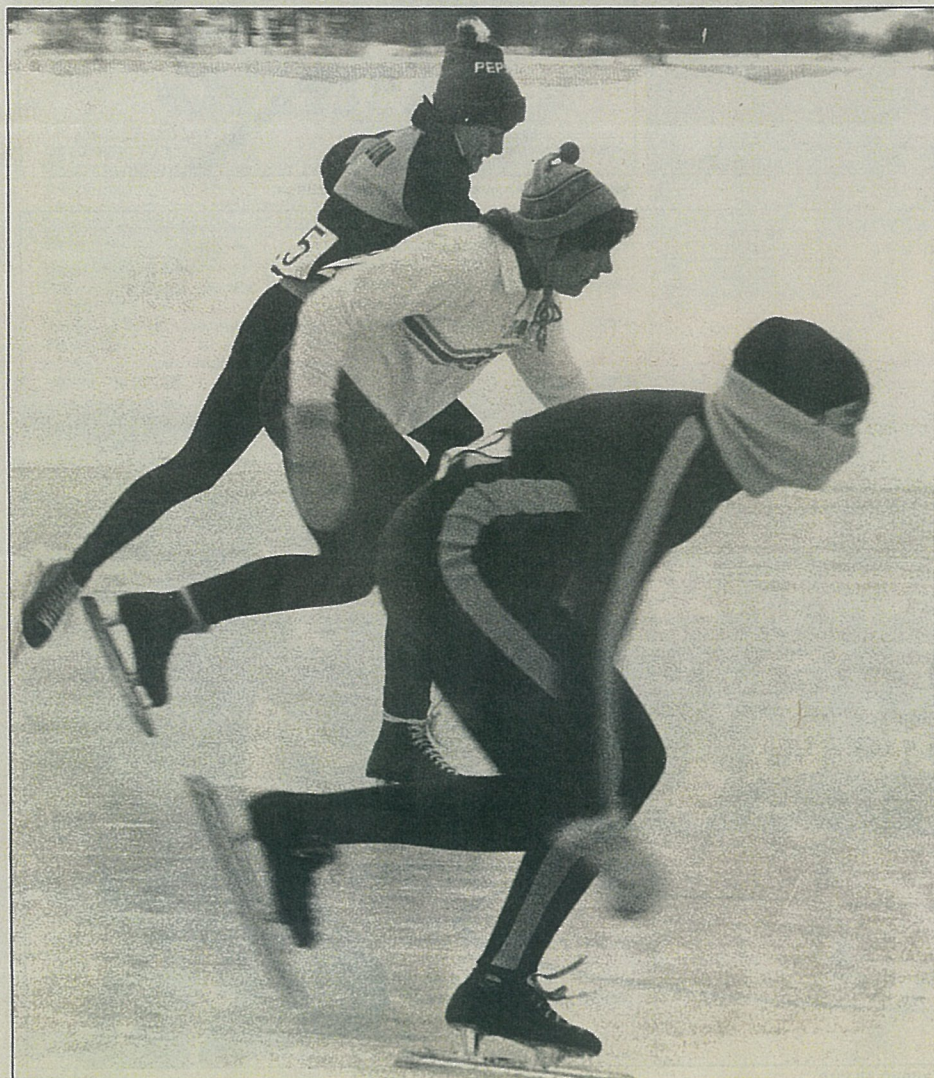

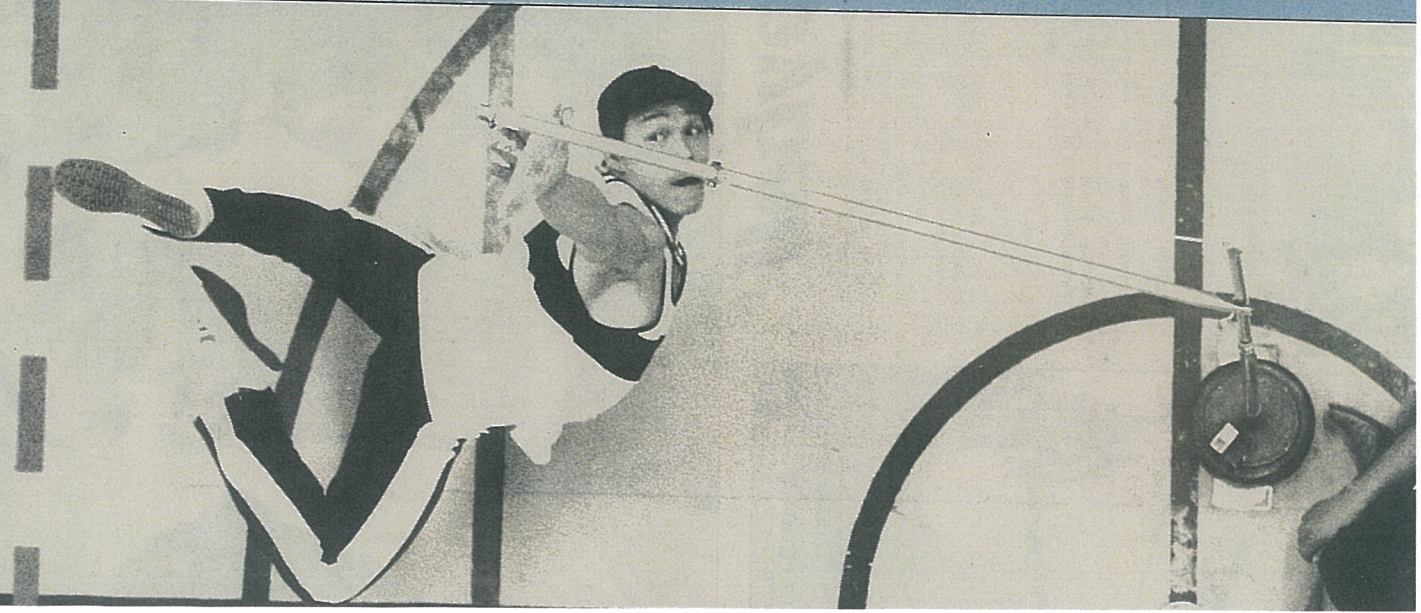

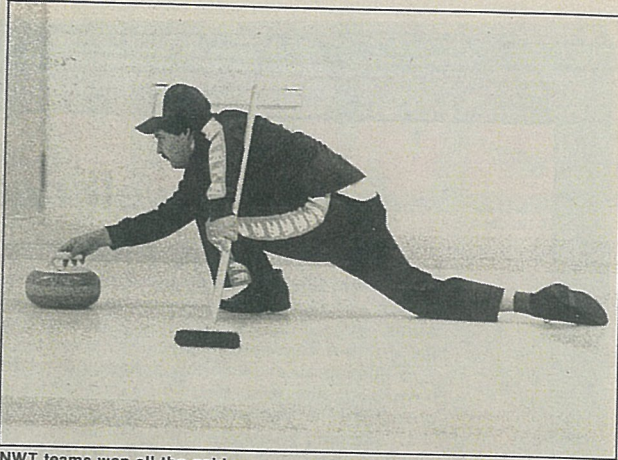

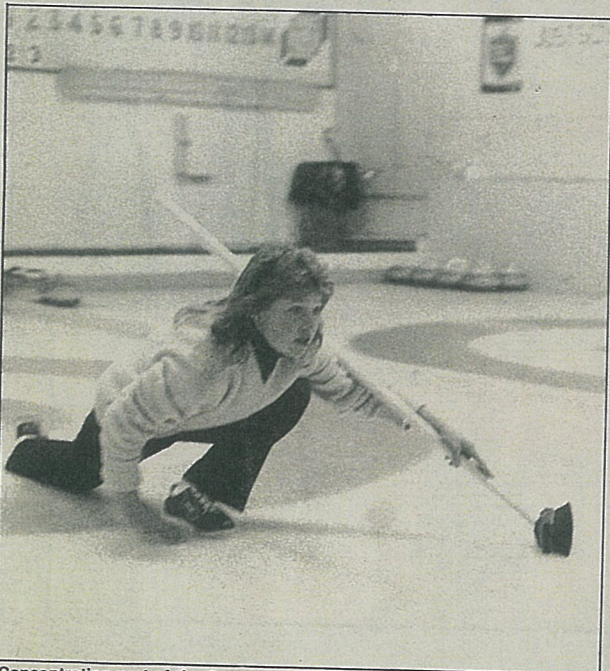
