



## Survival skills

Many fans thought yesterday's match-up between the Magadan and Alaska Pee Wee hockey squads was an accident waiting to happen but everyone (except Alaska) was pleasantly surprised by the Russians' strong showing.

Northern News Services Alaska was favoured going into the game because of an obvious size advantage, however, the small but speedy and skilled Magadan squad managed to overcome a two-goal deficit late in the third period to tie the

Magadan got strong backing from netminder Denis Ivashchenko who smothered an Alaskan breakaway with only minutes remaining in the

Magadan had to dig deep and dis-play great endurance during the three 15-minute periods since they only brought two lines to Canada and no spares as compared to a strong Alaskan bench with three lines.

Magadan coach Vladimir Razgouliaev says his team was a bit appre-hensive going into the game but hoped to tie the Americans. They got their wish.

The tie boosted Magadan's confidence, says Razgouliaev, because they now know they can rely on their skills and be competitive at the Arctic Winter Games

Speaking through an interpreter, Razgouliaev says his team performed satisfactorily but took four unnecessary penalties which had a big impact on the outcome of the game. The Magadan coach praised the Alaskan team as a good skating team of strong "courageous" players.

Barry Bran of Yellowknife was among the spectators cheering for Magadan yesterday morning. Bran says the Russians remind him of the NWT Pee Wee team that coach Wes MacAleer guided to the Arctic Winter

Games about a decade ago.
"The NWT team was maybe a step up, they were a fantastic team. They were small and fast like Magadan and everyone thought they would be a pushover - until they started skating! They only had two lines too, so they stressed stamina and endurance

Four members of the NWT Bantam hockey team were also among the spectators. Jeffrey Bowden of Yel-lowknife thought the Alaskan team was more solid. Ashley Rivers of Yellowknife also thought the Alaskans were the better team with greater depth on the bench. Anthony Kataluk of Coral Harbour was pulling for Magadan. "They have some pretty good players. They're small but fast." Joey Kusugak of Rankin Inlet also liked the small but speedy Magadan

All four of the NWT players agreed upon one thing, that the Magadan players are extremely friendly. re also hockey fanatics.

Magadan's dedication to hockey is also reflected in their willingness to raise \$2,000 per player in order to travel to the '98 Arctic Winter Games. Most of the funds came from parents and team sponsors, says Razgouliaev.

The Magadan coach says trips such as this are worthwhile for everyone involved because the Russian and North American teams can learn a lot from each other.

Everybody does it, and there's no GST, NAFTA, customs or duty or any other nasty price attached. It's fun, easy, only





# By the book

Practitioners of Inuit Arctic Sports received a valuable training aid yesterday with the unveiling of a manual and video designed to put them on equal footing with "southern-based sports" that have developed coaching

The four-part training and resource manual and video were unveiled and distributed during the opening ceremonies for Aretic Sports held at noon Monday in JH Sissons Elementary School.

On hand for the unveiling were Patrick Tagoona, President of the NWT Arctic Sports Association, Bill Lyall of Arctic Cooperatives Limited, NWT Government Minister Manitok Thompson, Bishop Christopher Williams and John Bales, President of the Coaching Association of Canada. Emic Bernhardt was the Master of Ceremonies for the opening ceremonies.

"We're hoping that this will not only help the sport to survive in competition with other sports but hopefully it can expand," says Chris Szabo of the NWT Department of Municipal and Community Affairs. "We think it would be perfect... to see these Inuit sports in a large multi-sports event like the North American Indigenous Games."

The manual and video were unveiled at the Arctic Winter Games because the Games are the only international event where Arctic Sports are played and because they were developed in partnership with a number of the contingents participating in the AWG.

Arctic Sports trace their ancestry to the time when, during the winter, elders would teach young men skills that would be used during the hunting season. Arctic games were never meant for competition, states the Arctic Sports program. "At social gatherings among the villages, the young men would display their abilities and test their skills against each other. They were done in the spirit of fun. This is why the games are based on a strong sense of tradition, sportsmanship and cameraderie."

"By participating in the games, the young men could learn what their limits are and better prepare themselves for the hunt." according to Bob Akiens, Head Inuit Judge of the 1996 Arctic Winter Games, "If you didn't know your limits, you could die. You have to know how far you can push yourself."

The nine Arctic sports are: one-foot high kick, two-foot high kick, one-hand reach, kneel jump, Alaskan high kick, knuckle hop, airplane and arm pull. There are two Russian events in Arctic sports at this year's Arctic Winter Games, the sledge and triple jumps, but they are not included in the manual.

The training and resource manual and video for Arctic Sports were produced by the Northwest Territories' Municipal and Community Affairs in conjunction with a number of partners, says Szabo, MACA's Manager of Sports and Recreation Programs.

Working with MACA to produce the manual and video were the Coaching Association of Canada, the NWT Arctic Sports Association, the governments of Alberta, the Yukon and NWT, Nunavut Tunngavik Incorporated (NTI), the Arctic Winter Games International Committee and Sport North.

Games International Committee and Sport North.

Reaction to the manual and video has been "...very good so far," says Szabo. Members of the AWG International Committee and various political leaders had a sneak preview of the manual and video early Monday morning and both were well received, says Szabo.

The first section of the manual explores the culture of Inuit people and the place of Arctic Sports in that culture, says Szabo. The second section examines in greater detail the types of games that were played.

"The third section puts the Inuit games into a modern coaching context where they talk, for example, about nutrition, flexibility and coaching philosophy," says Szabo. "In the last section, we actually break down the nine Arctic sports... so that a coach can do a movement analysis with his or her athletes and... coaches can get athletes to do the various activities properly."

The video is to be used in conjunction with the fourth section on movement analysis and shows properly executed Arctic sports in normal speed and slow motion, says Szabo.

MACA has plans to produce similar manuals in the future on Inuit wrestling, Dene games, dog mushing and snow shoeing.

The Yukon trainer and coach, with participation in five previous AWG events behind her, predicts it will be a tremendous boost to her territory's flagging record in that venue.


"Arctic sports has really diminished in the Yukon since the 1980s. Those athletes are now adults, and youth development was barely surviving," she said.

But now, a two-year integration of arctic sports into the regular school gymastics curriculum is underway. Already, there are impressive results. "Within a month, some of our students were setting gold and silver-level achievements from past Winter Games."

The reason for the success, she believes, is that Arctic Sports is a perfect companion to the essential skills of a gymnast — balance, strength and flexibility.

Gymnasts also benefit because their performance tends to peak in their early teen years. Arctic Sports gives them something to grow into for several more.

MacPherson credits the Yukon Government, Sport North, and their partnership with the University of Calgary for their commitment to developing the manual and video that were unveiled today. Now, can an Arctic Sports event at the Olympics be far behind? Well, remember what they said about snowboarding...

"It's easy to service, not too much money and easy to develop," says coach Sergei Vlasov, himself an easygoing man who greets you with a high-five, not a hand shake.

That might also explain why it's more popular among boys than girls, although there are also female competitors at the top of their game as well.

"It's a difficult sport. Psychologically you must be very strong. Every point, every serve is like a small war. You must be quick, like a snake, and react instantly."




Tyuman table tennis coach Sergei Vaslov (centre) watches his charges at work.
