





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

Dog mushing is a family affair for the Knutsen's.

"Other families go skiing, we go dog mushing and winter camping," says mother Jan.

"We train together and help each other out when we lose our dogs," says Tammy. "And there's someone else who's as scared as I am just before the race."

Jan admits being a mom

and coach can be trying, especially when it comes to telling the girls to clean up the dog run. But yesterday when Tammy won her first ulu she says "it's terrific."

Sarah says the time spent together with the dogs makes their friendship stronger. "Even if we're mad at each other in the house, the dogs help us to make up."

Both the girls say they feel like a team, rather than competitors with each other.



Okay, somebody be nice and return that jacket to Greenland coach Isak Kleist.



Mask dance dates back 3,000 years

The mask dance begins quietly enough.

Greenland performer Maariu Olsen matter-of-factly explains the purposes of the dance as he kneels on stage before the audience, painting his face in preparation and stuffing something under his upper lip in order to create a bulbous effect. He is dressed in a grey body-hugging leotard.

The mask has three main purposes, he says. The first is for pure entertainment; making oneself as ugly as possible, into a clown. People need to have fun with themselves and with others, says Olsen.

The second purpose, he adds, is the ritual of fertility. The dancers are able to switch their character from one sex to another.

The final purpose is to teach kids about fear, "so they know the quality of fear in their body," says Olsen. He adds that they need to know how they will react because when they become hunters they often have to face danger and be able to deal with it.

As he finishes speaking three other creatures appear out of the shadows moving stealthily towards the audience, some crawling, some upright. He joins them and they spread out like a net approaching the audience from all angles. Their movements are slow and sinewy, their faces contorted and ghoulishly painted. Strange chanting and low drumming accompany the dance, punctuated occasionally by shrieks and guttural sounds.

A dancer moves towards a young child, hovering, contorting her face and moving yet closer. The child tries to move away but the dancer moves after her.

The audience is spellbound and when the dance draws to a close, a feeling of relief seems to fill the room.

3,000 years old

Olsen says archaeologists believe the mask dance originated in Alaska about 3,000 years ago and moved east through northern Canada and then to Greenland. Now it is only practised in eastern Greenland, he says.

Olsen says the theatre group Silamuit was formed five years ago by graduates from Tukak, the only theatre school for Greenlanders. It is located in Denmark.

The group, based in Nuuk, Greenland's capital, is made up of seven members. Olsen says they started small but have grown to include a mobile recording studio.

The Greenland government has also been providing them with grants allowing Silamuit to bring their performances to other countries. The group has travelled and performed in Norway, Denmark, Sweden, France and throughout Greenland, he says.

The mask dance is the only traditional theatre they perform, says Olsen, adding most of their work is experimental, incorporating body language and masks.

They also perform musi-



icals, says Olsen, adding, the group writes their own music, designs the choreography and makes their own costumes. Issues covered range from local to global.

The group also acts in television ads about AIDS and alcohol abuse and has put out music videos and films.

Too add yet another dimension to their range, they perform clown shows for kids and produce tapes of children's songs, says Olsen.

Silamuit will tour Iqaluit and other N.W.T. settlements this April and plans to have a new show ready for performing in June.

Humble beginnings for mascot

It all started with a half-inch lapel pin.

Knifee, the official mascot of the 1990 Arctic Winter Games, owes his good looks to the City of Yellowknife's official lapel pin.

When Elaine Lower of Yellowknife was approached by the AWG Host Society to design and construct Knifee, she turned to the knife-shaped pin for inspiration.

"I tried to get as close to that as possible," says Lower, who is well known in Yellowknife for constructing costumes such as the Fraggles and California Raisins for the YK Women's Bonspiel.

The creation of Knifee—from drawing board to finished costume—took Lower from May to September of 1989.

The actual construction process took about 120 hours of "trial and error," she adds.

Although Lower has never seen her creation in action firsthand, she did see Knifee performing during an evening report on CBC Television.

Her reaction? "It just seemed right to see him out there. I hope people like him."

The idea of creating an AWG mascot in the shape of a "yellow knife" came from Yellowknife students Laura Wilson, Jesse Griep, Lisa Harrison, Maria Mantla and Stacy Reid.
