and we're not finished yet.





The opening night of the "Fantasy in Pashion" in the Public School Auditorium, was held up for twenty minutes while extra chairs were brought in to seat the overflow crowd of about six hundred which was on-hand to view this special production demonstrating Northern fashions.

The show of fashions from Aklavik, Port Bur well, Frobisher Bay, Coppermine, Snowfrift, Rankin Inleit, Gjoa Haven and Fort Simpson was originally organized by Wes MacAleer, Jim Whelly, Ted Boldt, John Sears and Heather Pritchard.

In one sketch coming to life before the Northern Lights and the beautiful music of the Arctic Ocean, "Sedma the Sea Goddess" of Eskimo folklore captured the imagination of all who watched.

Called Niviatsiak in Eskimo Sedna created the creatures of the seas as the dancers' interpretation carried us into the land of legend.

The lithe and vivacious girls in "Boleros Beautiful" truly ac-

cented their outfits from Cambridge Bay and Baker Lake and the dazzling display of fashions in "Flurry of Fur" was in ex-pensive taste with muskrat, seal, and wolf of the North included in the selection.

Harold Huggins proved to be a very capable showman and reached the hearts of the children and funny bones of the adults

with his modelling technique.

At the Grande Finale commentator Steve Hook invited some

mentator Steve Hook Invited some honored guests to the stage. Commissioner Stu Hodgson of the Northwest Territories "expressed the appreciation of the audience for a very fine show to the director and cast.
