ARCTIC WINTER GAMES FINISH WITH BANGI

Standing in mild temperatures of over 20 above zero, more than 1200 athletes and spectators joined dignitaries in the official closing of the First Arctic Winter Games.

In a stirring torchlight ceremony, contestants from the Yukon, Alaska and the NWT gathered together to conclude a week of sports and cultural activities that brought together, in a spirit of sportsmanship and friendliness, the peoples of North America's three most northerly areas.

From a specially constructed stage erected for the occasion, dignitaries of all three competing areas spoke of the value of the games and their hopeful results.

After short comments by Games Society president Doug Fin-layson, Senator Lowell Thomas of Alaska, President of the Arctic Games Corporation Ken McKinnon of the Yukon and Commissioner Stu Hodgson of the NWT led to the introduction of the "Father

Commissioner Hodgson mentioned the important part played by former Alaskan Governor Walter Hiekel and acknowledged the support of Yukoner Cal Miller who had always been a strong supporter.

A jubilant Bud Orange expressed that "our effort will add to national unity and international understanding."

He then thanked the organizers, workers, coaches and officials, and made a special thanks to the citizens of Yellowknife who had "opened their hearts and their homes to everyone".

Mr. Orange then called on the Capitan of the NWT contingent, Harry Condon, to receive the Games flag, which will be kept and circulated throughout the NWT until the next Arctic Games in Whitehorse in 1972. Harry's speech was short, but impressive... "it's wonderful", he said, and the home town crowd added their agreement....

A few seconds later, a rousing cheer to "Canada" came from the Alaskan delegation, and was immediately followed by a salute to "Alaska" by the Canadians.....

Bud Orange closed the ceremony by stating... "With the extinguishing of the flame of the First Arctic Winter Games, I declare these Games closed".

The National Anthems of both countries preceded an impressive fireworks display which expressed the inner feelings of everyone... It was accompanied by a dazzling display of snowmobiles carrying torches and indicating the conclusion of the Arctic Games......
